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How Is Man Saved?

In Romans 3:10 we read, "There is none righteous, no not one", then in verse 23 we read, "For all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God." From these verses, we learn that man is guilty of sin and separated from God. However, God is "not willing that any should perish" (2 Peter 3:9). God sent His son to earth to "save his people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21). Let us look now at what the Bible teaches about the salvation of man.

Man is saved by the grace of God. "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God" (Ephesians 2:8). Man is undeserving to have such a gift, but God so loved us that He provided a way that man can be saved. As we read in Romans 5:8, "God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us."

Man is saved by the blood of Christ. "Neither by the blood of goats and calves, but His (Christ-DAC) own blood he entered in once into the holy place, having obtained eternal redemption for us" (Hebrews 9:12). Notice Revelation 1:5, "And from Jesus Christ, who is the faithful witness, and the first begotten of the dead and the prince of the kings of the earth. Unto him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in his own blood." Christ was the perfect sacrifice for our sins. He willingly gave His life and shed His blood so that we can be cleansed from our sins (John 10:17,18; 1 John 1:9).

Man is saved by the preaching of the gospel. "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek" (Romans 1:16). "Moreover, brethren, I declare unto you the gospel which I preached unto you, which also ye have received, and wherein ye stand; By which also ye are saved..." (1 Corinthians 15:1-2).

Man is saved by faith. Christ speaking says, "...for if ye believe not that I am he, ye shall die in your sins" (John 8:24). Notice the

importance the writer of Hebrews gives to the subject faith, "But without faith it is impossible to please him for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of those that diligently seek him" (Hebrews 11:6). No one can doubt the essentiality of faith if one is to be pleasing to God.

Man is saved by works. "...work out your own salvation with fear and trembling" (Philippians 2:12). This does not mean that man can work to merit his salvation, but there are works of obedience that man must do. Upon *hearing* the teaching of the word of God taught and *believing* it; man is to *repent* of his sins. Repentance is commanded for salvation, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38). After the change of heart comes, then man is to confess his faith. We see this in Acts 8:37 at the conversion of the Ethiopian eunuch, and also, when Paul told the Romans, "For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation" (Romans Baptism is also commanded for man to be forgiven of his sins. We see this in Peter's statement in Acts 2 and in Peter's first epistle when he states "that baptism doth also now save us" (3:21). After obeying the gospel, those in Christ are to live faithful lives in service to Him. Therefore, man is not saved by works of merit that he might boast, but works are necessary to show our fatih is alive (James 2:24-26).

May we see the need of our salvation and the urgency with which we need to obey. "Behold, now is the accepted time; behold now is the day of salvation" (2 Corinthians 6:2).

When I got to thinking about it, I had too much pride in almost every instance. "Pride goeth before destruction and a haughty spirit before a fall," said the wise man (Proverbs 16:18). There are lots of things we can learn from bad days – that life is short, that we need more knowledge so as to make better choices, that friends are more important than progress, that character is better than money, that excellence is more excellent than success. Bad days teach us good things.

Use the bad days to draw closer to God. When everything is good, when there are no cars in your lane and nobody is on your back about anything, when things are just fine, it's easy to forget God. We dare not. When a bad day comes, we should use it to make sure that when we have a good one we don't forget who we are and from whence we are come. Thankfulness can certainly come out of bad days. Prayer is closer when things aren't right. God is more important when we need help. Brethren have a greater value when we're down and out.

Remember, the sun will shine again. "In the day of prosperity, be joyful, but in the day of adversity, consider." Good advice from Solomon, the man who saw life from every angle (Ecclesiastes 7:14). We need to rejoice at all the good things we have. There's a time for that, a time to be glad and enjoy all our blessings. But when things are not good, we need to reflect, ponder, meditate. That's good for us, too. Bad days come, but so do good days. And for those of us who are His children, we have a blessed assurance that the sun will shine again, even if we must endure the most horrible day of all.

Oh, by the way, I sure had a good day the next day. But I doubt that I learned as much.
