"Once Saved, Always Saved"

There are many sincere people that have been taught that once one is redeemed by the blood of Christ, it is impossible for him to sin and be lost eternally. Is this what the Bible teaches? Let us examine the question, "Does the Bible teach that once man is saved, he is always saved?"

In 1 Corinthians 15:34 Paul writes, "Awake to righteousness, and sin not." Again to the Ephesians he writes, "Be ye angry, and sin not" (Ephesians 4:26). Paul, writing to Christians at the church at Corinth (1 Corinthians 1:2) and the saints at Ephesus (Ephesians 1:1), warns the saints (Christians) that they could sin, and he admonished them to be careful to sin not! Paul's teaching, by the guidance of the Holy Spirit, is clear that it is possible for Christians to sin.

The answer is sometimes offered, "Well, of course man will sin, but the grace of God will take care of that." In Romans the question is asked, "Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound?" The answer follows, "God forbid. How shall we that are dead to sin, live any longer therein." (Romans 6:1-2). Yes it is possible to sin, but Christians are not to live in sin. Again in 1 Corinthians 10, Paul reminds the Corinthians about the apostasy that occurred among the children of Israel. He then tells the Christians at Corinth to remember this example. Why? Because Paul says, "Wherefore, if a man thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall." Why would Paul warn them about falling and remind them of the failures of Israel if it was impossible to fall?

In Acts 8, we read of Simon, a sorcerer in Samaria, who had heard and obeyed the gospel. He was interested and wanted to be involved in the kingdom. But when Peter and John came and laid hands on the Samaritans so that they could receive the miraculous gifts of the Holy Spirit, Simon desired to have this same power. He offered Peter money to receive the gift. Peter responded to Simon's request by telling him that he had sinned and that in order to not perish, he must repent and pray for forgiveness. We see here that Simon, in sinning after having received the grace of God, stood in a condemned position if he did not correct

his standing before God.

The position of "Once Saved, Always Saved" may bring comfort and consolation to many individuals. However, the truth of the matter is that the word of God does not teach this and many souls will be eternally lost because of this teaching.

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The Bridge Back To God

Some folks have the idea that we're all destined for heaven, but there might be some obstacles in the way. Well, God certainly wants all to be saved (2 Peter 3:9), but sin so separates man from God that a bridge has to be built back to His side. And as with most bridges, there are several components in the Plan of Salvation.

However, a confirmation that all sin separates us from God is in order. Open your Bible and you will see that Adam and Eve were separated from the tree of life because of their sin, and they did die, just as God had told them. Sin doomed the whole world in Noah's day and brought God's wrath upon Sodom and Gomorrah. Through Ezekiel God said, "The soul that sinneth, it shall die..." (Ezekiel 18:20).

And Isaiah said this: "Behold, the LORD'S hand is not shortened, that it cannot save; nor His ear heavy, that it cannot hear. But your iniquities have separated you from your God; and your sins have hidden His face from you, so that He will not hear" (Isaiah 59:1). All men are lost, because all have sinned (Romans 5:12).

Now, from this perspective one can see the need for salvation. Christ came to seek and save that which is lost. He is the one mediator between God and man (1 Timothy 2:5), the Savior, the necessary bridge, between God and man (John 14:6).

The first component is hearing the gospel. "How then shall they call on Him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach, except they be sent...?" (Romans 10:14-15). The gospel is to be preached unto all creation (Mark 16:15), but hearers must be receptive. Prejudice, apathy, ignorance, and worldly distractions are all bad because they hinder hearing and understanding the gospel.

Genuine listening prompts faith. "Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God" (Romans 10:17). By observing the universe one might believe in God, but only by listening to what He says can a person be saved from sin. And only by learning God's word can a person be faithful to what God teaches. "Without faith it is impossible to please Him" (Hebrews 11:6).

Faith prompts a confession. "For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." (Romans 10:10) The bridge back to God includes acknowledgement of who Christ is. As the Ethiopian and Timothy made the good confession, so should all (Romans 14:11).

As naturalized citizens are expected to pledge allegiance to the country and to support the Constitution, so are Christians scripturally expected to confess their faith in Jesus as the Son of God. Such a declaration is reasonable.

Confession prompts action. When a person vocally states a position of faith, then he or she will feel the compunction to adhere to that position. In other words, those who confess Jesus as the ultimate authority in religion will be honor-bound to keep His commandments. "Faith without works is dead" (James 2:20).

Now, the first action a believer in Jesus would feel obligated to take is *to be baptized for forgiveness of sins*. (Acts 2:38) Observe these components of the bridge to salvation in the following Great Commission:

"And Jesus came and spoke to them, saying, 'All authority has been given to me in heaven and on earth. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age.' Amen" (Matthew 28:18-20).

There is first preaching; then there is faith in the authority of Christ; the confession understood in this passage; and then there is baptism.

Baptism is the action which puts one into Christ where there is salvation (2 Timothy 2:10). It is where forgiveness takes place (Acts 22:16). It is the act which assures one of salvation (1 Peter 3:21). The act of baptism is the action by which one puts on Christ, rising to walk in newness of life, having been born again (Galatians 3:27; Romans 6:3-4; John 3:3-5).

Once a person is saved from past sins, he is obligated to live a holy life, "Without which no man shall see the Lord" (Hebrews 12:14). By observing the teachings of Christ, one has the assurance that the Lord is with him (Matthew 28:20). The ungodly, on the other hand, are warned that the face of the Lord is against them (1 Peter 3:12).

Of course, God's Plan of Salvation is by His grace and mercy, and by obeying the gospel one does not merit salvation by his own good works (Titus 3:5). However, an active participation by the sinner is required to cross the bridge back to God. The components are hearing, faith, repentance, and baptism, and all the components are necessary.

Let you and I remember our place in following God to the fullest of our ability. Let us be humble in our own estimation and rely upon the Lord for guidance.
