The Troubled Hearts of Life

"Let not your heart be troubled; you believe in God, believe also in Me. In My Father's house are many mansions; if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to My self; that where I am, there you may be also." – (John 14:1-3).

The night before Jesus is crucified, He instructs His disciples for their troubled hearts. Imagine the life you always lived and how you had always seen things were going to be changed dramatically. It is precisely the coming change that is causing the disciples' hearts to be troubled. Jesus tells His disciples how to calm their troubled hearts. Let's consider Jesus' instruction to them.

The Fact of Troubled Hearts. Jesus recognizes the reality of troubled hearts. Job long ago wrote, "Man who is born of woman is of few days and full of trouble" (Job. 14:1). It is a fact troubled hearts are a reality. Troubled hearts are universal. Trouble and sorrow are often buried beneath smiles and temporary happiness of earthly splendor. Jesus had lived 33 years, and He understood trouble and sorrow in life. He had experienced friends who had disappointed Him, who were sick and died. Trouble is real, but it is not because of God but because of Satan and sin.

Jesus' Attitude Toward Troubled Hearts. Jesus never shunned others in times of trouble. In Matthew 14, the disciples are in a boat crossing the sea when a terrible storm causes fear and distress for the disciples. Jesus came to His disciples walking on the water. When Jesus got in the boat, the wind ceased, and those in the boat recognized Jesus' power to calm the storm. We see Jesus again sharing in the sorrows of men. In Matthew 9, a ruler came to Jesus asking him to go to his house where his daughter had just died. "So Jesus arose and followed him, and so did His disciples" (Matthew 9:19). In John 11, Jesus' good friend Lazarus is dead, and Jesus makes His way to be with the grieving family and to sympathize with them (John 11:16-35). Jesus shared in the trouble of

men and understood the need to comfort them. Let us learn not to shun people in trouble but to help them as much as we can. Why? Because trouble is real, and all must deal with it.

Jesus' Remedy for the Troubled Heart. The remedy Jesus gives His disciples is:

1. **Believe.** Our faith is the first thing Jesus mentions in dealing with troubled hearts—our faith in God, who desires the best for us. God so loved us that Jesus came to save us from our sins (John 3:16). Peter tells us that “the eyes of the Lord are over the righteous and His ears are open to our prayers” (1 Peter 3:12). Remember God is our creator and can “do exceedingly, abundantly above all that you may ask or think” (Ephesians 3:20). Let us draw power in troubled times from our faith in God.
2. **Hope for the Future.** Jesus declares that His going away is temporary so He can prepare a place for us in His Father’s mansion. The word “mansion” is translated from a word that means “to abide.” At this time, the disciples are troubled that Jesus is leaving them. Often, trouble comes in times of separation. Jesus reminds us that a remedy for trouble is our hope of having an abiding place in the Father’s house. No more separation. No more sorrow. No more pain. What a great thought to keep our minds focused on the hope for the future.

In this life, we will suffer trouble, but may we help our troubled hearts by remembering these words given to Jesus’ disciples.



Those Old Testament Stories

Is the Old Testament less accurate than the New?

It isn't uncommon to find people who say they believe the latter but have trouble accepting some of the Old Testament stories. Theologians and seminary professors often head the list!

While we might address this matter in several ways,

consider just one question: What did Jesus think? In view of His claim to be the embodiment of truth (Jn. 14:6), His testimony regarding any questionable account is decisive.

No stories from the Old Testament have come under more attack than the accounts of creation, the flood, and Jonah. Many dismiss these as folklore or myths. Interestingly, Jesus had occasion to refer to all three. Each time He plainly regarded them as history.

The history of creation is the basis of Jesus' teaching on marriage and divorce. He pointed out that from the beginning of creation, God made male and female and joined the two in a permanent union; therefore, divorce is wrong (Mark 10:1-12). What kind of position would this be if it were based on folklore?

Jesus used the flood to teach us about His second coming. Just as the suddenness of the flood took Noah's generation by surprise, so Jesus' return will catch many off guard (Matthew 25:37-39). “Therefore, be on the alert...” (v. 42). Could Jesus expect people to take His coming seriously if He likened it to a myth?

When the skeptics asked Jesus for a sign, He replied, “No sign shall be given but the sign of Jonah the prophet; for just as Jonah was three days and three nights in the belly of the sea monster, so shall the Son of Man be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth” (Matthew 12:39-40). The resurrection was the ultimate proof on which Jesus based His claims. Surely He would not have compromised its validity by paralleling it to some legend!

It was of the Old Testament that Jesus affirmed, “The Scripture cannot be broken” (John 10:35). We may not understand just how some of its events transpired, but we may have every confidence they did.

Learning To Worship God

“Thus, I will bless You while I live; I will lift up my hands in Your name. My soul shall be satisfied as with marrow and fatness, And my mouth shall praise You with joyful lips. When I remember You on my bed, I meditate On You in the night watches.” – Psalm 63:4-6

If we are seeing God, we will want to reach the point at which we honestly enjoy the worship of God. Making the choice to engage in worship on set occasions is wise of course, and as far as Christians worshipping together is concerned, the New Testament certainly shows that the earliest followers of the Lord did that every week (Acts 20:7; Hebrews 10:25). To be spiritually mature, however, is not only to engage in acts of worship regularly but also to have the kind of character that delights in doing so, even when there is no special occasion.

The true joy of worship is a joy that must be learned. No doubt, there are people who find it easy to enjoy some of the superficial aspects of worship, but most of us will find that worship is an acquired taste. The regrettable modern tendency to turn worship into something that is naturally enjoyable, and even entertaining, should not blind us to the fact that true worship is the spiritual adoration of God, a thing that does not come naturally to carnally-minded people. We will not enjoy worship as God wants us to enjoy it until we have come around to His way of thinking

As the above selection from Psalm 63 shows, David was a man whose highest happiness was the worship of God: “My mouth shall praise You with the joyful lips.” It’s unlikely that David’s arm had to be twisted to get him to the tabernacle at the various times prescribed in the Law of Moses. But those special times at the tabernacle would have meant so much to David because of what happened in his life every day and every night: “When I remember You on my bed, I meditate on You in the night watches.” – and then we also will enjoy the exaltation of special worship.

“We — or at least I — shall not be able to adore God on the highest occasions if we have learned no habit of doing so on the lowest. At best, our faith and reason will tell us that He is adorable, but we shall not have found Him so, not have ‘tasted and seen.” — C.S. Lewis.
